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## **Clinton Continues to Lead Obama by 2:1 In Florida Democratic Primary**

***Clinton 52%, Obama 25% Edwards 12%***

**EAST LANSING, Mich.** — Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton continues to have a 2:1 lead over Sen. Barack Obama in the Florida Democratic Primary according to a telephone poll of likely voters conducted Sunday and Monday nights, January 27-28, 2008 by Mitchell Interactive, an East Lansing, Michigan and Washington DC based national polling and market research company. Clinton is getting 52% of the vote to Obama's 25%. Edwards has only 12% while 11% are undecided.

The survey of 906 likely Democratic voters has a margin of error of + or - 3.2% at the 95% level of confidence.

"Sen. Clinton is on her way to a big double digit victory in Florida, the last state before the February 5<sup>th</sup> Super Tuesday Primaries," Steve Mitchell, president of Mitchell Interactive said.

An examination of the crosstabs shows interesting information:

- Clinton is winning a more than a majority (54%) of the white vote but more than six in ten African-Americans (61%) are supporting Obama. Clinton is getting only 26% of African-Americans.
- Clinton also has a strong 70%-21% lead among Hispanic voters.
- Clinton is taking 55% of the women's votes and 48% of the men's votes.

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Mitchell Interactive's final poll in South Carolina showed McCain winning by 3%, he won by 3%. In Michigan, the company was the only pollster polling during the last week to have Romney ahead. Its final poll had Romney leading by 6%, he won by 9%.

In the Democratic race in Michigan, the company's total for Hillary Clinton was off by only 1% from her final total in a state where Obama and Edwards were not on the ballot, but where both urged voters to vote "uncommitted."

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
