April 6, 2008 - Pennsylvania Democratic Primary Preference

Barack Obama leads Hillary Clinton 53% to 36% among men (46% of likely Democratic primary voters). Among women, Clinton leads 52% to 39%.

Clinton leads 52% to 36% among white voters (80% of likely Democratic primary voters). Obama leads 89% to 9% among African American voters (16% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Obama leads 52% to 38% among voters age 18 to 49 (52% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Clinton leads 52% to 38% among voters age 50 and older.

27% of all likely Democratic primary voters and 41% of likely Democratic primary voters age 18 to 49 say they would never vote for Hillary Clinton in the primary and 25% of likely Democratic primary voters say they would never vote for Barack Obama in the primary.

Sample Size: 600 completed telephone interviews among a random sample of likely Democratic primary voters living in Pennsylvania (600 Democrats).

Sample Dates: April 5-6, 2007

Margin of Error: ± 4 percentage points, 95% of the time, on questions where opinion is evenly split.

April 4, 2008 - Indiana Democratic Primary Preference

Hillary Clinton leads Barack Obama 49% to 47% among men (44% of likely Democratic primary voters). Among women, Clinton leads 56% to 41%.

Clinton leads 57% to 39% among white voters (85% of likely Democratic primary voters). Obama leads 79% to 18% among African American voters (11% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Clinton leads 50% to 46% among voters age 18 to 49 (50% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Clinton leads 55% to 41% among voters age 50 and older.

22% of likely Democratic primary voters say they would never vote for Hillary Clinton in the primary and 33% of likely Democratic primary voters say they would never vote for Barack Obama in the primary.

Sample Size: 600 completed telephone interviews among a random sample of likely Democratic primary voters living in Indiana (467 Democrats and 133 independents and Republicans).

Sample Dates: April 2-3, 2008

Margin of Error: ± 4 percentage points, 95% of the time, on questions where opinion is evenly split.
