## March 31, 2008 - North Carolina Democratic Primary Preference

### North Carolina

Democrats	Mar 29-30
Clinton	38%
Obama	51%
Someone else	4%
Undecided	7%

Barack Obama leads Hillary Clinton 50% to 35% among men (44% of likely Democratic primary voters). Among women, Obama leads 51% to 40%.

Clinton leads 49% to 37% among white voters (62% of likely Democratic primary voters). Obama leads 78% to 17% among African American voters (34% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Obama leads 51% to 39% among voters age 18 to 49 (49% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Obama leads 51% to 38% among voters age 50 and older.

30% of likely Democratic primary voters say they would never vote for Hillary Clinton in the primary and 22% of likely Democratic primary voters say they would never vote for Barack Obama in the primary.

Sample Size: 600 completed telephone interviews among a random sample of likely Democratic primary voters living in North Carolina (491 Democrats and 109 unaffiliated (independent) voters).

Sample Dates: March 29-30, 2008

Margin of Error:  $\pm 4$  percentage points, 95% of the time, on questions where opinion is evenly split.

## March 28, 2008 - Pennsylvania Democratic Primary Preference

### Pennsylvania

Democrats	Mar 7-8	Mar 26-27
Clinton	52%	51%

Obama	41%	39%
Someone else	1%	2%
Undecided	6%	8%

Barack Obama leads Hillary Clinton 51% to 38% among men (45% of likely Democratic primary voters). Among women, Clinton leads 61% to 30%.

Clinton leads 60% to 30% among white voters (79% of likely Democratic primary voters). Obama leads 83% to 11% among African American voters (17% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Obama leads 46% to 43% among voters age 18 to 49 (53% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Clinton leads 60% to 32% among voters age 50 and older.

13% of likely Democratic primary voters say they would never vote for Hillary Clinton in the primary and 23% of likely Democratic primary voters say they would never vote for Barack Obama in the primary.

Sample Size: 600 completed telephone interviews among a random sample of likely Democratic primary voters living in Pennsylvania (600 Democrats).

Sample Dates: March 26-27, 2007

Margin of Error:  $\pm 4$  percentage points, 95% of the time, on questions where opinion is evenly split.
