In Texas, Hillary Clinton leads Barack Obama among self-described Democrats 53% to 41% and Obama leads Clinton among self-described independents and Republicans 62% to 33%. Obama leads Clinton among men 59% to 36% (44% of likely Democratic primary voters), and Clinton leads Obama among women 56% to 37%.

Clinton leads Obama among white voters 55% to 40% (51% of likely Democratic primary voters), Obama leads Clinton among African American voters 83% to 9% (22% of likely Democratic primary voters), and Clinton leads among Hispanic voters 63% to 31% (27% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Obama leads among voters under 50 54% to 40% (60% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Clinton leads among voters over 50 58% to 36%.

Clinton and Obama are tied at 49% each among early voters (24% of likely Democratic primary voters), while Obama is at 47% and Clinton is at 46% among in-person voters.

In Ohio, Obama leads among men 54% to 39% (45% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Clinton leads among women 61% to 35%.

Clinton leads among white voters 59% to 36% (83% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Obama leads among African American voters 88% to 7% (16% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Among voters age 18 to 49 (57% of likely Democratic primary voters), Obama leads 51% to 45%. Among voters age 50 years and older, Clinton leads 59% to 35%.

Among early voters, Clinton leads 56% to 43% (23% of likely Democratic primary voters). Among in-person voters, Clinton leads 50% to 44%.

In Texas, John McCain leads Mike Huckabee 63% to 26% among self-described Republicans. Among self-described independents and Democrats, McCain is at 51%, Huckabee is at 24%, and Ron Paul is at 19%. Among men (55% of likely Republican primary voters), McCain leads Huckabee 67% to 18%. Among women, McCain leads Huckabee 54% to 35%.

Among men (55% of likely Republican primary voters), McCain leads Huckabee 59% to 22%. Among women, McCain leads Huckabee 59% to 30%.
