In Texas, Hillary Clinton leads Barack Obama among self-described Democrats 47% to 44% and Obama leads Clinton among self-described independents and Republicans 71% to 25%. Obama leads Clinton among men 59% to 30% (46% of likely Democratic primary voters, and Clinton leads Obama among women 53% to 42%. Clinton leads Obama among white voters 52% to 40% (52% of likely Democratic primary voters), Obama leads Clinton among African American voters 83% to 9% (23% of likely Democratic primary voters), and Clinton leads among Hispanic voters 50% to 40% (24% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Sample Size: 600 completed telephone interviews among a random sample of likely Democratic primary voters living in Texas (475 Democrats and 125 independent voters and Republicans).

Sample Dates: February 23-24, 2008

Margin of Error: ± 4 percentage points, 95% of the time, on questions where opinion is evenly split.

Ohio

In Ohio, Obama leads among men 49% to 37% (46% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Clinton leads among women 59% to 31%. Clinton leads among white voters 56% to 31% (82% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Obama leads among African American voters 79% to 15% (16% of likely Democratic primary voters). Among voters age 18 to 49 (61% of likely Democratic primary voters), it is Clinton 43% and Obama 42%. Among voters age 50 years and older, Clinton leads 58% to 34%.

Sample Size: 600 completed telephone interviews among a random sample of likely Democratic primary voters living in Ohio (467 Democrats and 133 independents and Republicans).

Sample Dates: February 23-24, 2008

Margin of Error: ± 4 percentage points, 95% of the time, on questions where opinion is evenly split.

In Texas, John McCain is at 46% among self-described Republicans and Mike Huckabee is at 44%. Among self-described independents and Democrats, McCain is at 51%, Huckabee is at 21%, and Ron Paul is at 19%. Among men (54% of likely Republican primary voters), it is McCain 43% and Huckabee 41%. Among women, McCain leads Huckabee 48% to 40%.

Sample Size: 600 completed telephone interviews among a random sample of likely Republican primary voters living in Texas (487 Republicans and 113 independent voters and Democrats).

Sample Dates: February 23-24, 2008

Margin of Error: ± 4 percentage points, 95% of the time, on questions where opinion is evenly split.

In Ohio, McCain leads Huckabee among self-described Republicans 47% to 44% and McCain leads among self-described independents and Democrats 68% to 21%. Among men (52% of likely Republican primary voters), it is McCain 45% and Huckabee 43%. Among self-described independents and Democrats, McCain leads Huckabee 57% to 37%.

Sample Size: 600 completed telephone interviews among a random sample of likely Republican primary voters living in Ohio (499 Republicans and 101 independents and Democrats).

Sample Dates: February 23-24, 2008

Margin of Error: ± 4 percentage points, 95% of the time, on questions where opinion is evenly split.
