In Texas, Hillary Clinton leads Barack Obama among self-described Democrats 54% to 43% and Obama leads Clinton among self-described independents and Republicans 58% to 39%. Obama leads Clinton among men 59% to 37% (45% of likely Democratic primary voters), and Clinton leads Obama among women 60% to 38%.

Clinton leads Obama among white voters 58% to 39% (50% of likely Democratic primary voters), Obama leads Clinton among African American voters 84% to 14% (22% of likely Democratic primary voters), and Clinton leads among Hispanic voters 65% to 33% (28% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Obama leads among voters under 50 54% to 43% (59% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Clinton leads among voters over 50 60% to 37%.

Obama leads Clinton 52% to 47% among early voters (34% of likely Democratic primary voters), while Clinton leads Obama 52% to 45% among in-person voters.

In Ohio, Obama leads among men 54% to 44% (45% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Clinton leads among women 65% to 33%.

Clinton leads among white voters 64% to 34% (83% of likely Democratic primary voters) and Obama leads among African American voters 86% to 3% (16% of likely Democratic primary voters).

Among voters age 18 to 49 (56% of likely Democratic primary voters), Obama leads 50% to 48%. Among voters age 50 years and older, Clinton leads 66% to 32%.

Among early voters, Clinton leads 59% to 40% (25% of likely Democratic primary voters). Among in-person voters, Clinton leads 55% to 43%.

In Texas, John McCain leads Mike Huckabee 59% to 33% among self-described Republicans. Among self-described independents and Democrats, McCain is at 48%, Huckabee is at 33%, and Ron Paul is at 18%. Among men (55% of likely Republican primary voters), McCain leads Huckabee 58% to 31%. Among women, McCain leads Huckabee 55% to 35%.

In Ohio, McCain leads Huckabee among self-described Republicans 61% to 27% and McCain leads among self-described independents and Democrats 49% to 33%, with 15% for Ron Paul. Among men (55% of likely Republican primary voters), McCain leads Huckabee 59% to 22%. Among women, McCain leads Huckabee 59% to 36%.
