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Clinton Leads Obama by 2:1 In Florida Democratic Primary

Clinton 50%, Obama 25% Edwards 12%

EAST LANSING, Mich. — Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton has a 2:1 lead over Sen. Barack Obama in the Florida Democratic Primary according to a telephone poll of likely voters conducted Sunday night, January 27, 2008 by Mitchell Interactive, an East Lansing, Michigan and Washington DC based national polling and market research company. Clinton is getting 50% of the vote to Obama's 25%. Edwards has only 12% while 14% are undecided.

The survey of 462 likely Democratic voters was conducted Sunday night after Obama's huge South Carolina Primary victory on Saturday. The poll has a margin of error of + or - 4.5% at the 95% level of confidence

An examination of the crosstabs shows interesting information:

- Clinton is winning a more than a majority (53%) of the white vote but about more than six in ten African-Americans (60%) are supporting Obama. Clinton is getting only 25% of African-Americans.
- Clinton is winning almost equally with both men and women.

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Mitchell Interactive's final poll in South Carolina showed McCain winning by 3%, he won by 3%. In Michigan, the company was the only pollster polling during the last week to have Romney ahead. Its final poll had Romney leading by 6%, he won by 9%.

In the Democratic race in Michigan, the company's total for Hillary Clinton was off by only 1% from her final total in a state where Obama and Edwards were not on the ballot, but where both urged voters to vote "uncommitted."

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
